# 1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

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## 1.1 INTRODUCTION

Situated in a rural area of Tinsukia, Tinsukia Commerce College was established in the year 1972. The college aims at offering quality higher education in Commerce and Arts to its students as per norms laid down by UGC, MHRD, Govt. of India and Dibrugarh University (the affiliating University), Assam. In its attempt to equip the students with knowledge, skills and knowhow to succeed in the highly competitive modern world, the college strives to offer relevant courses, updated teaching learning mechanism with digital aids to all students regardless of class, caste, gender, religion, background with optimum use of the resources available; both human, and infrastructural. It seeks to contribute to betterment of the social, cultural and environmental spheres with emphasis on personality development, confidence building, healthcare, career growth and empowerment of the students, faculty, supporting staff and local inhabitants.

The developmental activities of the college are monitored by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) which has also been instrumental in making plans, projects on academic, infrastructural, sports, cultural, environmental, administrative aspects of the college, and has been implementing these with approval from the Governing Body, and support from various committees and sub-committees formed by it. The IQAC collects, maintains and analyses documents directly through the college office. Policies/ plans regarding quality assurance are communicated to all stakeholders through means like the prospectus, college website, annual magazine, meetings with committees and sub-committees, etc.

The college saw NAAC Peer Team's visit for the second time in 2017, and has made the following improvements for quality enhancement of the institution according to their recommendation like: Better infrastructure in terms of classrooms with furniture and fixtures, common room for boys and girls with RUSA infra grant; adequate number of teachers and support staff have been appointed as per government guidelines; job oriented courses have been introduced; increased use of ICT in teaching has been incorporated; setting up of language lab, counseling cell and placement cell, Providing coaching for competitive examinations; Fully computerized library with CSR grant from Oil India Ltd. Tinsukia Commerce is the only college in Assam to have developed Khelo India Centre.

### Vision

The college's vision is to provide education that seeks to generating humility and worthiness among the student fraternity. The institution works keeping in view the vision statement so as to ensure the holistic development of the neighbouring community. In line with the vision of the college, Tinsukia Commerce College aspires to mould its students into worthy individuals by providing value-based quality education replete with all life skills that ensure their all round development.

Keeping in mind the vision statement, the objective behind the Undergraduate programme of B Com under CBCS is to impart both theoretical and practical knowledge on various areas and specific subjects of modern Commerce. The B.Com Honours course enables the students to specialize in their subject interest and gain

extensive and in-depth knowledge about those particular subjects. The general and ultimate aim of the programme is to increase employability of the students in the job market, especially in corporate sector and motivate them towards entrepreneurship.

On the other hand, the motive behind the BA programme is to offer a rich variety of subject to help the students to understand how historical, cultural, geographical, sociological, political, linguistic and environmental forces shape the world as well as the individual. Based on specific fields of skills, these programmes are basically skill and job oriented. They also facilitate the students by cultivating future research interests in them.

## **Mission**

The college has been developing infrastructure for facilitating delivery of academic activity as per the mission statement “to facilitate quality education, inculcate traditional values, national responsibilities, national integration, gender equality, etc. Tinsukia college is committed to the cause of empowerment of rural and urban youth through access to education in general and to impart Commerce, Computer Science, Management And Social Science in particular, enabling them to develop as intellectually alive, socially responsible and ever prepared for continuous personal and professional growth to inculcate social, moral and spiritual values. It is committed to provide wide range of professional and vocational courses besides conventional ones for rural and urban students to meet the changing needs. Similarly, student-centric education, innovative and inclusive education, etc. adopted by the college are also reflective of mission statement.

The institution has a Governing Body of which the Principal who is a dynamic and hardworking leader serves as the Secretary. They work together in determining and implementing various institutional policies to attain vision and mission. In line with the college’s mission, various extension activities are organized that involves social work which inculcates into the students the spirit of unity, brotherhood, empathy, equality and team spirit that make life meaningful and complete. Community benefit programmes are organized by the college in association with the students to make them understand the significance of serving the society unconditionally. All these extra-curricular activities organized by the college are aimed at creating a positive aura within the campus that would lead to holistic development of students, faculty, college fraternity and the neighbouring community.

## **1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)**

### **Institutional Strength**

- Well defined vision and mission.
- The college has available land for expansion.
- A clean and green campus.
- Workforce of the college is efficient. Though the number of faculties is less in number, but they are hard working and sincere which has led to increase in the number of students in both Arts and Commerce streams year after year.
- Sufficient modern equipments to aid ICT based teaching.
- The result of the end semester examinations during last five years have improved significantly. Number of students securing First Class and high CGPA has also risen in number.
- The development of college infrastructure facilities post Second Cycle NAAC Accreditation has seen a marked difference. Old classrooms have been renovated, eight new classrooms have been constructed,

drinking water sanitary facility, multi gym and computer lab have been redesigned and rebuilt.

- Improved sports facilities, community development programmes have led to the better outcomes.
- The college has received green champion award from the government due to impressive efforts towards greenery and pollution free environment.
- The number of students getting employed in government and corporate undertakings have been increasing as a result of career counseling programmes, tie ups with various employment and consultancy agencies.
- Connections established with institutions through MoUs.
- Regular submission of AQAR.

### **Institutional Weakness**

- The college has been running with insufficient number of permanent faculties. After retirement of all regular clerical staff, the temporary staff is under excessive workload.
- Many of the departments have single faculty without separate departmental facilities.
- The departments lack libraries of their own. Also the college library needs to have much larger number of textbooks and reference books.
- The performance in the area of research has been much below par.
- Heavily dependent on government funding.
- Start up needs to be strengthened.

### **Institutional Opportunity**

- Getting ready for NEP 2020 with its multi-disciplinary approach is the important opportunity we have at hand.
- The college is looking ahead to introduce specialty programs in subjects like Banking and Human Resource Management provided qualified teachers are made available.
- Master of Commerce (PG) can be introduced.
- More career counseling programmes, coaching for competitive examinations and more research initiatives on the part of faculties and students needs to be undertaken.
- Community outreach programmes organized by the college has helped to gain leadership role in the local neighborhood.
- Students getting scholarships, fellowship and financial support has gradually increased in number.
- The college has ample scope for commerce education.

### **Institutional Challenge**

- Introducing more job-oriented courses with such limited number of permanent faculties and office staff has been a major challenge. Four posts in office and two faculties in permanent category are yet to be fulfilled by the government.
- Most of the students enrolled are from rural and economically backward classes. The college is generally in receipt of average and below average standard of students and therefore it poses a challenge for the college to maintain the standard of the university in respect of their result.
- The standard of communication skill and general knowledge of the general students being miserably low, so the college takes it as a challenge to give them a boost to maintain minimum standard through

various means.

- The college lacks residential facilities for boys and girls coming from distant areas.

## 1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

### Curricular Aspects

The college offers three programmes: B.Com Honours, B.Com Non-Honours and B.A. Non-Honours. Considering the demand of the society and neighbouring students, the authority considered it prudent to introduce B.A. programme from the session 2011-2012 under Dibrugarh University. CBCS was introduced in all the Undergraduate courses offered by the college in 2019. Along with the three main programmes, the college also offers various certificate courses to facilitate the students' skill, ability enhancement and develop employability.

The college has three ODL centers for Undergraduate and Postgraduate programmes. They are affiliated to DODL of Dibrugarh University, KKHSOU and ASOS respectively.

The college always follows innovative pedagogical practices such as case studies, group discussions, etc. It pays special attention in identifying the slow and advanced learners through methods like questioning, probing, group discussions, class tests, assignments, etc. After identification, they are aided with adequate help and personalized strategic teaching techniques to cater to their individualistic needs. Separate remedial classes are taken to help them cope up with the demands of the curriculum.

Before the commencement of the semester, prospectus is uploaded in the college website where programmes and courses offered by the institution are disclosed. Lesson Plans and Teaching Plans are prepared for timely completion and effective delivery of the course curricula. Timetable, academic calendar, syllabus, learning outcomes, guidelines, etc. are uploaded on the college website. The faculty members maintain their academic diary to complete the curriculum of the courses as per schedule. This activity is assessed by the Principal, Vice Principal and the academic committee at the end of every month. Students' diary is also used as a tool to enhance and monitor their meta cognitive skills and strategic delivery of the curriculum.

### Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Innovative teaching and learning process is provided by the college in order to enhance the capacity of the students to imbibe their lesson in a structured and systematic manner. Therefore, several students' centric learning methods have been initiated like unit test, seminars, assignments, presentations, participative learning, brainstorming sessions, projects, group discussion, industrial tours etc. in order to meet the diverse needs, interest and capabilities of the learners.

Participative learning is encouraged to ensure that the teaching- learning process is more dynamic and meaningful. Peer learning helps to build teamwork and 'Learning by doing' develops confidence hence both are emphasized and encouraged. Practicals are also added to the curriculum to help students to develop better understanding and retain information for longer periods.

The mechanism followed for internal assessment maintains complete transparency. The components of internal assessment are as per directed by Dibrugarh University. The Examination Committee constituted by the

authority notifies schedule of sessional examinations. At the beginning of the semester the teachers, in their respective classes, inform students about the process and components of internal assessment.

The internal assessment marks are notified in the college notice board and students are allowed to report the grievances to examination committee about their marks. Supplementary Sessional examinations are also conducted for the students who do not perform well in the Sessional examinations which is also a prominent initiative of the examination committee.

Evaluation method comprises of two Sessional examinations, group discussions and seminars. All the faculty members involve in internal assessment and evaluation process and discuss the performance of evaluation and assessment with the students.

### **Research, Innovations and Extension**

The college has created an ecosystem for innovations and taken initiatives for creation and transfer of knowledge. The institution maintains Research Cell headed by the Principal. This Cell makes a conscious effort towards creating and sustaining research environment in the institution. It encourages the faculty members to participate in seminars, webinars, conferences, workshops, etc. and to publish research papers in national and international research journals. The research cell looks after the project activities of the students under the course curriculum as well. Hence, the funding of research projects helped the college to upgrade its teaching and to make it relevant and practical.

Project Go Green has been undertaken by the Research Cell to promote the culture of organic cultivation to enhance sustainability of the environmental resources.

The extension activities involve social work, socially relevant communication and entrepreneurship. This benefits both the students and the community. The college has one NSS unit consisting of 100 cadets and one NCC unit consisting of sixty cadets. Blood donation camps, free health check up programmes are organized by college's NSS unit where students and faculty members participate actively.

The NSS unit conducts plantation and gardening programmes, cleaning drive under Swachh Bharat Abhiyan and Yoga Training Programmes in nearby villages of the college. Events like Socio-economic survey and voter's awareness programmes are also held.

The college organizes football coaching camps in the college playground for children below thirteen years of nearby localities. The college playground has been selected for Khelo India Sports Centre for football by the Government of India.

Plant a sapling programme has been introduced by the college for those students who have received free admission into the college programmes owing to their underprivileged economic background.

The college adopted 5 villages under Unnat Bharat Abhiyan. Tinsukia Commerce College is a member partner of a Flagship programme of IIT Delhi under Ministry of Education.

The college has initiated on giving tutorial classes to the nearby school going under privileged students.

The College has adopted 5 patients TB removal programme under the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare

‘Pradhan Mantri TB Mukh Bharat Abhiyaan’.

## **Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

Tinsukia Commerce College is situated in a rural setting with a lush green campus of 11.33 acres. The 6 blocked campus is incorporated with well constructed infrastructure. A split level 400 seater auditorium supported with audio facility, a well-equipped seminar hall with smart panel and Wi-Fi connectivity and most of the classrooms having audio-visual equipments like smart panels with Wi-Fi facilities. The college has provision for a teachers’ common room and two students’ common rooms for boys and girls respectively. There are two rooms for student activities, one for NCC and one for Tinsukia Commerce College Students’ Union. Additionally, the college has a sick room for any emergency medical concern in the campus.

The grassy well-maintained playground is well used by the students to partake of a wide range of outdoor sports like football, volleyball, kabaddi, etc. The college also has a cemented cricket pitch and a newly constructed basketball court. Indoor sports facilities support sporting activities such as table tennis, carrom and chess. The college also has a modern multi-gymnasium with 16 stations along with two separate changing rooms for boys and girls that aims to help develop fitness for both the college students and youths of nearby areas. There is a well functioning canteen for the refreshment of faculties and students.

The entire campus is monitored by CCTV cameras. There is a spacious parking lot, a walking space from the entry gate towards the administrative building, well maintained fire and security systems and ramps for specially-able people.

A well stocked library equipped with SOUL 3.0 software, reference books, journals, newspapers and e-resources connected to an open access system provides an opportunity for the overall learning of students as well as faculty. The library is fully automated with ILMS and Barcode technology. The college has two internet connections, one from GEENET having speed of 100 mbps and another from BSNBL with 2/4 mbps. Office and laboratories have LAN and Wi-Fi connectivity with Tenda Routers. College has purchased original softwares such as SOUL 3.0, Windows, Ramdhenu, MS Office, Language Lab Software, Video Conferencing Software, ERP Myclasscampus and SPSS.

## **Student Support and Progression**

At the beginning of each new academic session, Orientation Programmes are organized and students are introduced to the course curriculum they have opted for and are acquainted with the aimed learning outcomes of the programme.

The teachers in classrooms devote time to make students well aware about their course outcomes.

The learning outcomes are discussed, reemphasized, reviewed and their current status is assessed time to time in the faculty and academic meetings.

The syllabus comprised of POs, COs, PSOs, structure of credit component and Internal Assessment is communicated to the students and the faculties of the college. And the same is made available in the college website for easy reference.

The curriculum has been designed to address the cross cutting issues in courses like Environmental Science, Sustainability, human rights, gender, Ethics and Universal human values.

To sensitize the students and the staff about gender issues, several workshops and programmes are conducted by the college.

The extension activities involve social work, socially relevant communication and entrepreneurship. This benefits both the students and the community. Social change and economic progress is brought from social work. It improves the self esteem and confidence among the students. Empathy, building communication skills and development of the creative minds are taught to the students through life skills

The college has identified slow learners, and extra attention is given to them to bring them at par with the rest of the students. Remedial classes and tutorials are also arranged on a personal level to identify their problems and keep track of their progress. One-on-one interaction enables the module of micro teaching to take place successfully.

Apart from academic teaching, value-based education is emphasized by the college that is universal in nature. The curriculum has been designed to address the current issues like Environmental consciousness, human rights, gender, professional and business ethics and a positive approach towards life.

To meet the entrepreneurial aspirations of the students and their guardians, a placement cell is constituted that strives to give a distinct edge to the students and alumni of the college in their professional ventures by making available opportunities in career development.

A well functioning NSS and NCC unit has brought many laurels to the college. It actively conducts various programmes ranging from plantation and gardening programme, Cleanliness drive, health camp, vaccination drive, blood donation camp, self defense programme, and so on.

Students are given exposure in the field of sports. Recognizing the significance of sports for mental and physical well being of the students, the college promotes both outdoor and indoor games. The College has been selected as the only Khelo India centre in Assam by the Directorate of Sports and Welfare, Government of Assam. Moreover, Tinsukia District Women's team won 2nd position in Assam Youth Olympics, 2022 (Football). Majority of the players are from Sripuria Football Academy and most of the football trials were organized by Tinsukia Commerce College in collaboration with Sripuria Football Academy. Notably, few football players of the college have been selected by Minerva Academy, NRL, Tulip and SAI.

### **Governance, Leadership and Management**

The college is run by a Governing body, headed by a Chairman appointed by the Department of Higher Education, Government of Assam. The institution practices a participatory mode of governance with all the stakeholders participating actively in running the administration. The institution has a Governing Body of which the Principal who is a dynamic and hardworking leader serves as the Secretary. Various committees and sub-committees are formed by the Governing Body and Principal to provide active support in managerial decision making process. The committees formed include Admission Committee, Academic Committee, Routine Committee, Examinations Committee, Purchases Committee, Internal assessment Monitoring committee, Library Committee, etc which work with specific plans and mechanism. Grievance Redressal Cell, Anti Ragging Cell, Placement Cell, Election Committee, Women's Cell, etc. are also functional. Particularly, a



mechanized performance appraisal system for teaching and non teaching staff is in place. The performance is measured by considering specified parameters as per UGC and Government Assam guidelines.

Policies and rules of State and Central Government, UGC, Affiliating University are strictly followed for the college's academic and administrative matters. The entire administrative setup of the college is based on guidelines of Directorate of Higher Education, Govt. of Assam. Appointments are done by following guidelines of Directorate of Higher Education, Govt. of Assam.

IQAC was formed in Tinsukia Commerce College on 6th March, 2006 as per norms of NAAC and since then it has been instrumental in guiding the institution towards a positive growth trajectory. . The IQAC conducts academic and administrative audit, energy audit and green audit. The IQAC of the college sends annual reports to NIRF. It prepares and submits Annual Quality Assurance Reports (AQARs) to NAAC. With the motive of increasing employability, IQAC of the college lays emphasis on the institution's academic affairs to provide quality education to the students and also aims towards their acceptance into premier education institutions across the country.

The management supports and encourages faculty to generate funds/sponsorship for organizing seminars, workshops and community initiatives and also motivate them for research activities. Industry-Academia collaboration with Bosch India, TCS for implementation of their CSR programme, specifically Skill Orientation to the students is one of the major strategic initiatives of the institution under the plans and programmes undertaken by the Placement Cell towards increasing employability of the students. An ERP system is implemented for making administrative and academic affairs effective.

### **Institutional Values and Best Practices**

Being located in a rural area, the college seeks specifically to cater to the needs of the nearby local communities. The college aims at benefitting all stakeholders by promoting all-round development.

Various programmes have been designed by the college to address issues and concerns regarding environmental consciousness, human rights, gender, professional and business ethics and positivity.

The best practices of the college are in line with the vision and mission formulated by the college.

In line with the vision of the college, “Vidya Dadaati Vinayam, Vinayaad Yaati Patrattam”, that means “Learning leads to humility, Humility begets worthiness”, the college aspires to mould its students into worthy individuals by providing value-based quality education replete with all life skills that ensure their all round development. Various initiatives like fee waiver scheme for underprivileged students, tutorial classes for school children from nearby villages, computer coaching for the nearby rural women, etc. are aimed at ensuring that every person can benefit from the right to education, skill and employability irrespective of class, caste, creed, gender or social status.

Keeping in mind the mission of the college, “to facilitate quality education, inculcate traditional values, national responsibilities, national integration, gender equality, etc.,” numerous initiatives have been taken to

help address social issues and concerns by conducting various seminars, conferences, talk session and so on. To promote environment sustainability, techniques like rainwater harvesting, vermicomposting, proper drainage facilities, use of solar panels, energy efficient bulbs, reducing carbon footprint by opting for public transport, complete ban of polythene bags, etc., have been introduced. Moreover, the college is highly committed towards sports and has developed sports friendly infrastructure. A MoU signed with Sripuria Football Academy shows that special impetus has been given to football coaching.

Notably, Tinsukia Commerce College is the only college in the state of Assam to be selected as Khelo India Centre by Directorate of Sports and Welfare, Assam.

##### **Response:**

Tinsukia Commerce College is affiliated to Dibrugarh University, Assam and follows the curriculum designed and developed by various BoS of the university. The college offers three programmes: B.Com Honors, B.Com Non-Honors and B.A. Non-Honors.

CBCS was introduced in all the Undergraduate programs offered by the college in 2019. Along with the three main programmes, the college also offers various certificate courses.

The college has two Open and Distance Learning Centers for Undergraduate and Postgraduate programmes affiliated to DODL of Dibrugarh University and KKHS Open University.

Some faculty members of the college have been actively participating in the Board of Studies and in the Board of examinations of Dibrugarh University.

The institution adheres to the academic calendar to ensure the smooth functioning of Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE). Academic committee of the college develops academic calendar in consultation with affiliating university's academic calendar taking into consideration the major events and activities to be undertaken in a particular year so that the process of curriculum delivery becomes more meaningful and effective. This ensures that academic discipline is maintained and there is no loss of teaching days.

Before the commencement of the semesters, prospectus is uploaded in the college website where programmes and courses offered by the institution are disclosed. Lesson plans and Teaching plans are prepared for timely completion and effective delivery of the course curricula. Time table, academic calendar, syllabus, learning outcomes, guidelines, etc. are uploaded on the college website.

The college always follows innovative pedagogical practices such as case studies, group discussions, etc. It pays special attention in identifying the slow and advanced learners through methods like questioning, probing, group discussions, class tests, assignments, etc. After identification, they are aided with adequate help and personalized strategic teaching techniques to cater to their individualistic needs. Separate remedial classes are taken to help them cope up with the demands of the curriculum.

In addition to classroom teaching, augmentation of learning takes place through the conduction of various seminars, webinars, workshops, and talk shows by eminent personalities.

The students' progress and learning is continuously evaluated through regular assignments, surprise class tests and Q and A sessions. Regular academic meetings, faculty meetings and student union meetings are conducted to review and analyze the academic progress to resolve any issue that may arise.

The faculty members maintain their academic diary to complete the course curriculum as per schedule. This activity is assessed by the Principal, IQAC and the academic committee regularly. Students' diary is also used as a tool to enhance and monitor their meta cognitive skills.

CIE system of the college is robust and transparent. Based on academic calendar, internal examinations are conducted. Under the chairmanship of the Principal an examination committee is constituted every year to look into the affairs of examinations. Two unit tests followed by supplementary unit tests are conducted in each semester and results are displayed on the notice board. Students are also allowed to view their answer scripts through a well defined process.

During covid-19 pandemic, the curriculum delivery process was shifted to online mode through the use of various e-platforms like Webex, Google Meet, Google Classroom, Zoom app.and WhatsApp.

#### 1.3.1 Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

##### Response:

The college recognizes the need for holistic and overall development of individuals and to that end it has incorporated the inculcation of values through the introduction of a number of courses like Environmental Science, Philosophical Foundation Education, Multidisciplinary courses, Reading Gandhi, NSS, Religion and Society as per the CBCS curriculum under Dibrugarh University and organization of various events, workshops, street plays, talk shows, screening of documentaries and short films, etc.

The curriculum has been designed to address the cross cutting issues in courses like Environmental Science, Sustainability, Human Rights, Gender, Ethics and Universal human values.

To sensitize the students and the staff about gender issues, several workshops and programmes are conducted by the college authority, Student Union body, NSS, NCC and also the students themselves.

A Women and Legal Awareness workshop sponsored by National Commission for Women was conducted on the occasion of International Women's Day by the Women Cell of the college in collaboration with AASA NGO.

Women's Heart Month awareness programme was held in collaboration with Heart Care Society of Assam, Lions Club, Leo Club, Rotary Club of Tinsukia and Indian Red Cross Society. Many online Career Counseling and Personality Development Programme for the students of the college were organized by the IQAC in collaboration with SKILLFINITY. These programmes enable the present day youths to enhance their employability in the corporate world. A webinar on Employability Skills for Future was held in collaboration with the ICT Academy, Chennai for the benefit of the students.

A Health Awareness Programme was organized by Indian Council of Medical Research and RMRC, NE Region, Dibrugarh where they conducted various pathological tests of the participants along with a lecture cum presentation programme.

A seminar for the girl students of the college was organised in association with the Institute of Fashion Technology, Guwahati where the invited experts discussed the significance of Fashion and Interior Designing as career options for them.

Screening of short films on sexual harassment aims at encouraging people to raise their voice against sexual harassment faced by women irrespective of the onlooker's gender. It showcases different instances of harassment that women face in settings like workplaces, buses and restaurants where most of the onlookers stay silent. Keeping in view, the rising numbers of crimes against girls and women in the



country and to ensure safety and security of girls, self-defence training is also imparted to them .

Cyber Security Awareness Program was organized for the students to protect themselves from being hacked. It increases the understanding of cyber threats and empowers the public and to make them more secure online.

The college has an NSS unit with one hundred volunteers and an NCC unit with sixty cadets. Blood donation camps, free health check up programmes are organized by college's NSS unit where students and faculty members participate actively. Events like Socio-economic survey and voter's awareness programmes are held and the issues are resolved by forwarding them to the concerned authorities for necessary action.

## 2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

### 2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences using ICT tools

**Response:**

Innovative teaching and learning process is provided by the college in order to enhance the capacity of the students to imbibe their lesson in a structured and systematic manner. Therefore, several students' centric learning methods have been initiated like unit test, seminars, assignments, presentations, participative learning, brainstorming sessions, projects, group discussion, industrial tours etc. in order to meet the diverse needs, interest and capabilities of the learners.

Participative learning is encouraged to ensure that the teaching- learning process is more dynamic and meaningful. Peer learning helps to build teamwork and 'Learning by doing' develops confidence hence both are emphasized and encouraged. Practicals are also added to the curriculum to help students to develop better understanding and retain information for longer periods.

The institute has adequate infrastructure that supports ICT based teaching and learning including smart classrooms, an updated library, a fully operational Language laboratory and Computer labs.

Faculty members are well acquainted with the use of ICT during classroom hours and lectures and are highly interested in propagation of learning through digital medium along with traditional classroom based teaching. Classroom teaching is thus supportive with sharing of e-resources, presentations and recorded lectures.

The college has a Placement cell which contributes to increasing the employability of the students. To this end, the college conducts special talks, career counselling sessions, personality development programmes and so on from time to time.

Remedial classes and tutorials are regularly organized to make students more efficient. After the completion of each unit of the prescribed syllabus, the teachers make it a point to conduct doubt clearing sessions of the students at personal level. This involves one-on-one interaction enabling the module of micro teaching to successfully take place.

Classroom teaching is thus supportive with sharing of e-resources, presentations and recorded lectures. During COVID-19 pandemic, faculties made use of ICT based online teaching methods by using Google classroom, Webex, Zoom, Google meet, WhatsApp, etc, to deliver lectures and notes to the students.

College uses ERP system to provide an interface for maintaining academic affairs of the students. Moreover, e-resources specifically NLIST and Sage journals are commonly used in the library. The library is partially automated and uses SOUL 3.0 software. NLIST and INFLIBNET e-resources are available in the Library and subscribed e-resources from Sage Publication are also available in the Library resource system of the college.

The College has 64 computers and 11 laptops with genuine software. Several softwares are available for utilization of students, administrative staffs and faculty members.

The college has an auditorium having 400 intake capacity and a seminar hall which can accommodate 50 people. These two are used for special lectures, seminars and workshops. The seminar halls have overhead projectors and digitalized screens.

Moreover, college has Industry Academia Collaboration with BOSCH Limited, SKILLFINITY, ICT Academy, Chennai, Tool Room Training Centre, AMTRON to provide modern students centric teaching-learning and participative learning to the students of the college.

## **2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms**

### **2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient**

**Response:**

The mechanism followed for internal assessment maintains complete transparency. The components of internal assessment are as per directed by Dibrugarh University. The Examination Committee constituted by the authority notifies schedule of sessional examinations. At the beginning of the semester the teachers, in their respective classes, inform students about the process and components of internal assessment.

The Academic calendar of the college is followed for the sessional examinations. It is available on the college website and students are notified through the student notices and WhatsApp groups.

Evaluation method comprises of two sessional examinations, group discussions and seminars. All the faculty members involve in internal assessment and evaluation process and discuss the performance of evaluation and assessment with the students.

Faculty meetings are conducted periodically and internal assessment related issues are discussed and reviewed.

Once all discrepancies/grievances are handled, the internal assessment gets finalized.

The internal assessment marks are notified in the college notice board and students are allowed to report the grievances to examination committee about their marks. Supplementary sessional examinations are also conducted for the students who do not perform well or remain absent in the sessional examinations which is also a prominent initiative of the examination committee.

The college forms various committees such as internal assessment monitoring Committee, examination committee, grievances management committee for maintaining transparency and redressal of internal assessment grievances.

The grievances raised by the students related with internal assessment are resolved by examination committee in consultation with subject teacher.

Students grievances related to end semester examinations are forwarded to the controller of examinations, Dibrugarh University.

Faculty members discuss and show the answer scripts to the students. In case a student is not satisfied with the marks awarded, he or she can raise the grievances and such grievances are handled by concerned faculty member.

## 3.4 Extension Activities

### 3.4.1 Extension activities are carried out in the neighborhood community, sensitizing students to social issues, for their holistic development, and impact thereof during the last five years.

**Response:**

The extension activities involve social work, socially relevant communication and entrepreneurship. This benefits both the students and the community. Social change and economic progress is brought from social work. It improves the self esteem and confidence among the students. Developing empathy, communication skills and development of the creative minds are taught to the students through life skills. Creative minds and building team spirit helps in the development of solving problems. This can be appreciated from the brief description of the type of extension activities carried out during the last five years.

The college has one NSS unit consisting of 100 volunteers and one NCC unit consisting of sixty cadets. Blood donation camps, free health check up programmes are organized by college NSS unit where students and faculty members participate actively. Events like Socio-economic survey and voter's awareness programmes are held and the issues are resolved by forwarding them to the concerned authorities for necessary action.

The NSS unit conducts plantation and gardening programmes, cleaning drives under Swachh Bharat

Abhiyan and Yoga Training Programmes in nearby villages of the college.

The college organizes football coaching camps in the college playground for children below thirteen years of nearby localities. The college playground has been selected for small Khelo India Sports Centre for football by the Director of Sports and Welfare, Government of Assam.

“Plant a sapling” programme has been introduced by the college for those students who have received free admission into the college programmes owing to their underprivileged economic background.

A Street play on AIDS was conducted by the college.

The college adopted 5 villages under Unnat Bharat Abhiyan scheme of Govt. of India. The College is a member partner of a Flagship programme of IIT Delhi under Ministry of Education, Government of India.

The college has initiated on giving tutorial classes to the nearby school going under privileged students.

The IQAC of the college in its drive to spread philanthropy makes an annual contribution of amount Rs 12000 to NGO Snehalaya for specially abled students. The college has been one of the Mentor of this Tinsukia based NGO since inception.

##### Response:

Tinsukia Commerce College is situated in a rural setting with a lush green campus of 11.33 acres of land area. The 6 blocked campus is incorporated with all latest facilities for providing a conducive learning environment for both students and faculty. A split level 400 capacity auditorium supported with audio facility enhances the quality of the events held in it. College has a well-equipped seminar hall with smart panel and Wi-Fi connectivity. There are 16 classrooms with 9 of them having ICT and audio-visual equipments like smart panels with Wi-Fi facilities to enhance the quality of learning in an interactive manner. There is a IQAC room with computer, laptop and printer . Two computer labs with adequate softwares are available for enhancing the practical knowledge of students and also for the use of faculties. A well stocked library equipped with SOUL 3.0 software, reference books, journals, newspapers and e-resources provides an opportunity for the overall learning of students as well as faculty. The college has provision for a teachers' common room and two students' common rooms for boys and girls respectively. These rooms are equipped with amenities like Vending machine, incinerator, Table Tennis Board, LED, etc. There are two rooms for student activities, one for NCC and the other College Students' Union. Additionally, the college has a sick room for any emergency medical concern of its students.

The college accords high importance to the physical well being and cultural expression of the students. The grassy well-maintained playground is overwhelmingly used by the students to partake of a wide range of outdoor sports like football, volleyball, kabaddi, athletics, etc. The college also has a cemented cricket pitch and a newly constructed basketball court. Indoor sports facilities support sporting activities such as table tennis, carom and chess. The college also has a modern multi-gymnasium with 16 stations along with two separate changing rooms for boys and girls that aims to help develop fitness for both the college students and youths of nearby areas. College has a canteen for the refreshment of faculties and students.

The entire campus is monitored by CCTV cameras. There is a spacious parking lot, a walking space from the entry gate towards the administrative building, well maintained fire and security systems and ramps for specially-able people. The college in its bid towards an environment friendly campus, installed solar street lights, energy efficient electronic devices and vermi-compost pits.

The college playground hosts different sports events specifically Inter-college Kabaddi Tournament in 2018. College also organizes football coaching and trail camps in association with Sripuria Football Academy on regular basis. Moreover, every year the college conducts College week for sports, literary and cultural events.

Tinsukia Commerce College has a central library that is partially automated with ILMS and Barcode technology. It has text books 10843, reference books 1057 and subscription of journals 10, e-journals 10, CD/DVD 37, newspapers 05. Stock verification process is conducted by the library whenever the library committee feels it necessary. NLIST E-Resources are available. The library has a reading room with 40+ seating capacity. The library is kept open from 09:00 AM-5:00 PM on all working days. Students are allowed to borrow 2 books for a period of 15 day and teachers are allowed to borrow ten books for a period of 30 days. Teachers are also allowed to borrow 2 journals for a period of 30 days. There is provision for reservation of books and reissue for second time for respective periods to students and teachers respectively. Other college staff are allowed to borrow for a period of 15 days. The library purchases new books as per the suggestion or request of the faculty members and students. College library is automated by adopting several measures like

ILMS in the library: Tinsukia Commerce College library uses SOUL 3.0 developed by INFLIBNET Centre, Infocity, Gandhinagar Gujarat and also has Barcode technology.

Barcode System: All the library books are barcoded by generating the barcode through Brothers bar code software.

Book Browsing: The status of the holdings of the library can be checked using SOUL OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue) which supports advanced search strategies. Advanced search strategies provide



the users for library resources using details of author, title, subject, ISBN, series and call numbers, etc.

Digital Library: It has a separate digital library section with 5 computers and all are connected with the internet. There is a separate login register for the digital library section.

Wi-Fi based Library: Full Wi-Fi connectivity is available in the library. The library users can use the Wi-Fi service in the reading hall and in the digital library section.

Book requisition System: Students and teachers can request book acquisition by submitting a book requisition form.

QR Code Based service: Library provides online Old question papers access facility to its users by using QR code.

ID card printing and other services: The library is shouldering the responsibility of printing the college ID Card cum library card for all the stakeholders of Tinsukia Commerce College using College ERP and SOUL software. The college library is under CCTV surveillance.

#### Response:

The college regularly upgrades its infrastructure to help support in maintaining the college academics, administration, examinations and research related activities. The college allocates a budget for annual maintenance on the basis of the need and number of students as well as teachers. The continuous upgrades are done with the help of trained and experienced technicians. The College has a well-equipped seminar hall with smart panel and Wi-Fi connectivity and there are 9 classrooms having ICT and audio-visual equipments like smart panels with Wi-Fi facilities. The two computer labs with updated software facilitate teaching and presentations. There is 64 numbers of computers in the college and 11 number of laptops, 03 audio visual systems, 06 interactive smart panels, 02 projectors, 37 CCTV cameras, 02 servers, 08 LED TVs, 15 number of printers 07 numbers of Scanners and 2 Xerox machines available for students, teaching and non-teaching staff for academic and administrative purposes.

The college has two lease line internet connections, one from GEENET having speed of 100 mbps and another from BSNL with 2/4 mbps. Office and laboratories have LAN and Wi-Fi connectivity with Tenda Routers. College has purchased original softwares such as SOUL 3.0, Windows, Ramdhenu, MS Office, Language Lab Software, Video Conferencing Software, SPSS, Tally. ERP Myclasscampus, Tinsukia

Commerce College ERP developed by KB QUBE. These softwares are also updated from time to time according to the changing needs of the curriculum. All the housekeeping activities in the library including cataloguing, accessing and circulation have been computerized. In the library, updated versions of Windows, Library Management Software- SOUL 3.0, Barcode Scanner, Thermal Printer, and Biometric Attendance Facility are used. The college library uses SOUL 3.0 of INFLIBNET that provides easy access to the library catalogue (OPAC).

To promote minimal use of papers, electronic communication in terms of email and WhatsApp has been prioritized. Faculty members are encouraged to use of Google Classrooms, YouTube, Zoom, GMeet, Webex etc. for lecture notes sharing and online classes during Covid-19 pandemic. The college also has an up-to-date user-friendly online admission portal embedded in the website. All relevant data of the bona-fide students are electronically stored. The institution takes utmost care for up keeping and replacement of the IT tools whenever necessary. Moreover, beneficial activities such as installation of antivirus periodically, formatting of computers in case of corrupt operating systems, timely replacement of the hardware of old computers as well as new computers are undertaken yearly and it comes under Annual Maintenance Contract (AMC) with Dey's Computer, Tinsukia.

The college ensures safety of all individuals in the campus with the help of CCTV surveillance through 37 numbers of cameras on different floors, library, labs, open area and ground, entry exit gates, auditorium, parking lot, etc.

The college is administered by a Governing body, headed by President appointed by the Department of Higher Education, Government of Assam. It is a statutory body that includes University Nominee, representatives of teachers, employees, parents, reputed academicians, businessman, etc. The governing body manages the college as per defined Vision and Mission.

**Vision**

**“Vidya Dadaati Vinayam, Vinayaad Yaati Patrattam”**

**The vision statement of the college written in Sanskrit translates to:** “Learning leads to humility, Humility begets worthiness”. The college’s vision is to provide education that leads to generating humility and worthiness among the student fraternity. The institution works keeping in view the vision statement so as to ensure the holistic development of the neighbouring community.

**Mission**

The college has been developing infrastructure for facilitating delivery of academic activity as per the mission statement to facilitate quality education, to inculcate traditional values, national responsibilities, national integration, gender equality, etc. Similarly, student-centric education, innovative and inclusive education, etc. adopted by the college are also reflective of vision statement.

The institution practices a participatory mode of governance with all the stakeholders participating actively in running the administration. The institution has a Governing Body of which the Principal of the college serves as the Secretary. Members of the Governing Body work together in determining and implementing various institutional policies to attain vision and mission.

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) is formed as per the guidelines of NAAC, Bangalore to look after academic, co-curricular and extracurricular activities. IQAC has been active in performing various activities such as organization of National seminar and workshop, lecture programmes, conduction of annual meeting, and preparation of AQAR and evaluation of performance of teachers for promotion.

Project Monitoring Unit is constituted as per guidelines of RUSA, Assam to monitor the RUSA Projects and utilization of RUSA Grants of Rs. Two Crore. Various committees and sub-committees, are formed by the Governing Body and IQAC to provide active support in managerial decision making process. The committees formed include Admission Committee, Academic Committee, Routine Committee, Examinations Committee, Purchases Committee, Internal assessment Monitoring committee, Library Committee, etc which work with specific plans and mechanism. Grievance Redressal Cell, Anti Ragging Cell, Placement Cell, Election Committee, Women's Cell, etc. are also functional. Particularly, a

mechanized performance appraisal system for teaching and non teaching staff is in place. The performance is measured by considering specified parameters as per UGC and Government Assam guidelines.

The management supports and encourages faculty to generate funds/sponsorship for organizing seminars, workshops and community initiatives and also motivate them for research activities.

New infrastructure and equipment, renovation of laboratories, training of staff, etc. have been facilitated for successful implementation of updated system in the college. All the stakeholders are actively encouraged to participate and forward their opinions for effective decision making and policy formulation.

## 6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

#### Response:

Policies and rules of State and Central Government, UGC, Affiliating University are strictly followed for the academic and administrative matters of the college. The entire administrative setup of the college is based on guidelines of Directorate of Higher Education, Govt. of Assam. Appointments are done by following guidelines of Directorate of Higher Education, Govt. of Assam. As far as Service Rules are concerned, Fundamental Rules and Subsidiary Rules are followed.

The Governing Body is the apex body within the college, responsible for overall control and governance of the college. It undertakes appointment and promotion of both teaching and non-teaching staff. It approves the publication of advertisements and follows the selection process as per Directorate of Higher Education, Government of Assam rules and under the direction of Dibrugarh University for recruiting the staff on a permanent basis. Moreover, it grants different kinds of leave like study leave and child care leave from time to time.

All the activities of the college are done with the help of different committees which are formed in governing body and general meeting of the college. Some of the active committees are Construction Committee, Project Monitoring Unit, Women Cell, GSCASH, IQAC, Exam Committee, Internal Assessment Monitoring Committee, Exam Zone Committee, Centre Committee, Admission Committee etc.

The performance of the college in Swatch Bharat Abhijan and Green Campus Drives has been commendable throughout the years. The NSS and NCC Units, in association with District Forest Department, Environmental Protection Society, and different NGOs of Tinsukia etc., have undertaken

regular initiatives in cleanliness programs in and around the college campus. District Green Campus Award was offered to the college by the Govt. of India Swatch Bharat Mission in 2021. Plantation works have been solid.

Infrastructure increment and academic activities are the key components of Institutional Strategic and perspective plan which can meet the future needs of the institution. Some of the major infrastructure development of the college can be illustrated as:

Resource mobilized from RUSA and utilized for renovation and upgradation of classrooms, construction of new classrooms, purchase of multi gym equipments, development of computer cum language lab, etc. Project Monitoring Unit is constituted for implementation and monitoring of plans and projects under RUSA.

Resource mobilization from Oil India Limited under CSR initiative and utilized for construction of library building. Resource mobilized from CMSGUY scheme and utilized for development of playfield. Moreover, an alumnus of the college donated the college gate.

The financial management system, academic activities of the college are transparent.

ICT facilities of the college have been enhanced by using college internal fund. An ERP system is implemented for making administrative and academic affairs effective. College is effectively initiated and implemented different MoUs with national and state level institutions for enhancing academic activities. Internship programme for B.Com courses is also initiated. Industry-Academia collaboration with Bosch India, TCS for implementation of their CSR programme, specifically Skill Orientation to the students is one of the major strategic initiatives of the institution.

## 6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

### 6.3.1 The institution has effective welfare measures and Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff

#### Response:

Tinsukia Commerce College is a provincialised college under Government of Assam which follows the policies to provide welfare measures to the employees. The college has been adopting various welfare schemes for staff members (both teaching and non-teaching), and the college ensures to make them available on time and also take appropriate actions for providing these benefits as per the regulations that are followed by undergoing the due process. Group Insurance scheme, General provident fund and National Pension Scheme for the regular employees are the major welfare measures. Employees appointed by management are provided advanced salary for meeting their financial needs.

Childcare leave, maternity leave, paternity leave and medical leave are made available to all the staff members (teaching and non-teaching) of the college as per the rule of law. They are also facilitated to procure home loan, personal loan, car loan, etc.

A social welfare fund is created in the college to provide financial support to the employees and students of the college during emergency. The college has been providing two residential quarters to the support staffs of the college. For sports and recreation purposes, the college provides all employees the facility to access the basketball court and the outdoor ground for games like cricket, athletics and football. On request from faculty members, the college also facilitates the provision of laptops to the teaching members of the college. The college provides multi-station gym facility for the use of all its employees and students.

The College provides several opportunities of get together to the members for celebrating festivals and other events, birthday, etc. Furthermore, the college is producing organic fertilizer, seasonal crops and fruits etc. which are sold to the members of the college at reasonable price. Moreover, residential staffs are given the opportunity to do agricultural activities.

As a provincialised College, Tinsukia Commerce College follows the Performance Appraisal System designed by Director of Higher Education, Govt. of Assam and UGC. At entry level, for Assistant Professor, a detailed performance appraisal model is followed as directed by the Director of Higher Education, Govt. of Assam. Further, for career advancement of the faculty members PBAS / CAS system of self performance appraisal format as prescribed by UGC and Higher Education, Govt. of Assam is followed. Faculty members need to submit annual filled in Proforma of appraisal report for their yearly activities and achievement in academic and administrative aspects. In this juncture, teachers are required to furnish information in respect of their administrative position held, examination, evaluation duties undertaken: co-curricular activities related with students, extension activities, Seminar, Workshops, and Conferences attended, research activities undertaken etc. Additionally, feedback is taken from the students on teaching and learning issues; accordingly feedback is analyzed and communicated to the faculty members.

Non-teaching staff of the college is assessed regularly. They have been assessed on the basis of their work output, functional capacities, sense of responsibility, analytical ability, etc. Feedback is also taken from students on office and administrative issues and the performance of the officials.

#### Response:

Tinsukia Commerce College is regularly taking initiatives for mobilization of funds from various sources. Being a provincialized college of Department of Higher Education, Government of Assam, the college follows a transparent audit practices. It involves two-tier auditing practices: Internal and External Audit. The Internal Financial Audit of the college is regularly done by a Chartered Accountant firm/company that is registered in Institute of Chartered Accountants of India (ICAI). For the selection of Internal Auditor, a notification is issued for inviting quotations to conduct financial audit of the college. Accordingly, Governing Body of the college approves the Chartered Accountants Firm to whom the financial audit job is allotted. Till Financial Year 2021-22, all the accounts of the Institution were audited and reports were approved by the Governing Body.

The External Financial Audit is conducted by Director of Audit (Local Fund) Government of Assam. The College invites the External Audit Authorities i.e. Director of Audit (Local Fund) Government of Assam to conduct the financial audit of the college. Accordingly External Audit is conducted till the financial year 2019-20. Till now there has been no major audit objections raised by both Internal and External Auditors.

Additionally, Directorate of Financial Inspection, Govt. of Assam regularly inspects the financial affairs of the college.

It reviews teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities**

### Response:

IQAC was formed in Tinsukia Commerce College on 6th March, 2006 as per norms of NAAC and since then it has been instrumental in guiding the institution towards a positive growth trajectory. In the action plan of the college, IQAC suggests the faculty members to conduct remedial classes for the students. It also promotes application of ICT in teaching- learning process. Reviewing of results of each semester is done to assess the performance of the students. Additionally, it suggests the remedial measures to improve the quality of education. The IQAC conducts academic and administrative audit, energy audit and green and environment audit.

The IQAC of the college sends annual reports to NIRF. It prepares and submits Annual Quality Assurance Reports (AQARs) to NAAC. The college has already been awarded ISO certification on 8th February, 2022 after due assessment by RAPL.

The IQAC focuses on learner- centric teaching learning process and to achieve that it assesses and evaluates it periodically to ensure optimal implementation. In order to ensure constant scrutiny and improvement of teaching quality, the IQAC implements a robust Feedback Mechanism where regular feedback is taken from alumni, faculty, students and parents. This feedback is further analyzed for the regular development of learning outcomes with respect to all the courses in the curriculum and attempts are made to absorb and adopt the suggestions received during the feedback process for enrichment of the learning process and college's performance. By reviewing the teaching learning process, IQAC suggests gradual expansion, addition and regular upgradation of the requisites for the development and growth of the college.

With the motive of increasing employability, IQAC of the college lays emphasis on the institution's academic affairs to provide quality education to the students and also aims towards their acceptance into premier education institutions across the country.

- 8.As a part of outreach programme, the Women's Cell organizes certain programmes to create awareness on various issues for the neighbouring communities.

some of the major initiatives to promote gender equality and ensure well being of women are:

**Counseling:** The College periodically conducts Counseling programmes to address psychological and personal problems of the girl students.

**Common rooms:** The College has separate girls common room which facilitate students to enjoy segregated personal space as per their need. The room is equipped with facilities such as RO drinking water, first-aid kit, washroom, etc. along with vending machine and incinerator facility for the girls.

**Safety and security:** In order to make the campus safe and secure for girls, there are CCTV cameras placed at significant intervals across the entire college that operates 24x7. Trained security guards through the college day and night to maintain surveillance.

**Sports facilities:** Opportunities for NCC and NSS for girl students and gym facilities with separate changing rooms for girls are available.

**Gender Sensitization Committee against Sexual Harassment (GSCASH):** a vigilant body has been set up following UGC guidelines to handle any untoward incident of harassment that may occur in the campus. It operates on the principle of No Tolerance.

National Festivals, Death and Birth anniversaries of great Indian personalities are organized by the authority in collaboration with IQAC, Teachers and Students with great nationalistic fervor by breaking boundaries of caste, creed and religion. Events like National Voter's Day, NCC Day, NSS Day, World Environment Day, Foundation Day, Independence Day, Republic Day, Gandhi Jayanti, Assam Divas, Bhupen Hazarika Memorial Day and Bishnu Rabha Divas etc. are celebrated in the college premises in a befitting manner. The students of the college take pledge to maintain complete faith in democracy and dignity of democratic values. The Women's Cell organizes International Women's Day while International Disability Day is organized by NSS unit of the college. The festivals of Assam such as Rongali Bihu and Bhogali Bihu are also celebrated with great vigour in participation with the Teaching, Non Teaching staff and Student members. College observes Librarians' Day on 12th of August every year in memory of Dr. S. R. Ranganathan.

**7.1.4 Describe the Institutional efforts/initiatives in providing an inclusive environment i.e., tolerance and harmony towards cultural, regional, linguistic, communal socioeconomic diversity and Sensitization of students and employees to the constitutional obligations: values, rights, duties and responsibilities of citizens (Within 500 words)**

**Response:**

The college regularly conducts different programmes for ensuring an inclusive environment with special emphasis on cultural , regional , communal and socio economic harmony. Various festivals and cultural programmes are organized with the help of the students to maintain cultural and communal harmony.

One of the noteworthy initiatives that the college has initiated was to adopt five villages under Unnat Bharat Abhiyan and to ascertain the socio economic condition of the inhabitants, a survey was conducted. The villages in question are: Kadamoni Gaon, Dhekiajuri Bongali Gaon, Itakhuli Tea Estate 33, Bahbari Gaon and Tingrai Habi Gaon. As a follow up to the survey, a report was drafted and forwarded to different departments of Govt. of Assam so that necessary steps could be taken by the concerned authorities for upliftment of the socio economic status of the people.

Another initiative taken by the Principal of the college in association with the IQAC, teaching and non-teaching staffs was to provide free coaching to the school going children of underprivileged families of the region with the aim of imparting quality education to bring them at par with the privileged classes. Free computer coaching is provided to the women of nearby areas with the objective of making them empowered and self-reliant.

The college organizes health camps for the neighbouring communities to aid them to have a life free from diseases. Blood donation camps are held every year in the campus where all employees and students of the college are encouraged to participate for the noble cause. Vaccination drives are also organized in the college from time to time.

IQAC of the college regularly initiates numerous activities to sensitize students and employees of the institution in relation to values, rights, duties and responsibilities as citizens of the nation. Some of the measures to sensitize the stakeholders are:

- Voting awareness drive: IQAC of the college, with support from teaching staffs organises Voters Awareness Programme in the college campus. Students and employees are informed and motivated about the importance of exercising their voting rights in a democratic setup. Another significant activity that needs mention was the organization of a Voter ID and Adhaar Linkage programme.
- Environmental consciousness and sustainability: The College has been regularly organizing plantation programmes and cleanliness drives to keep the college and its surroundings clean. Project Grow Green has been initiated in the campus in collaboration with IQAC to train the students and to produce organic fertilizer using waste material. Training on vermi-composting is also conducted to propagate the best use of waste material. Rain water harvesting is being practiced in the college to enhance ecological stability. In its approach to increase sustainability, motion sensors are installed in different parts of the campus for automatically switching electricity connections.
- Sensitization to social issues: Seminars, workshops and talk sessions are regularly conducted on gender issues, legal matters, women empowerment, etc. to raise awareness about various social and legal issues and promote welfare of all citizens.

#### Response:

#### Best Practice A

Title: Creating a Green Campus

#### Objectives:

Nestled in a rural setup, the college is situated amidst greenery. The college recognizes the need for sustainable measures in a world confronted by major climatic challenges, and to tackle that, it has dedicated and devoted time, effort and resources since its very inception. In its efforts towards creating a green, eco-friendly campus, the college has formulated the following objectives:

- To promote eco-friendly practices among the students, teachers, supporting staff and the local inhabitants.
- To minimize pollution in and around the campus.
- To propagate water conservation: Rainwater harvesting, proper drainage facilities.
- To ensure proper waste management by following the 5R principle: Reduce, Reuse, Refuse, Rot and Recycle.
- To reduce carbon footprint by laying emphasis on the use of public transport.
- To promote tree plantation inside campus and also in the adopted villages.
- To minimize the use of single use plastic and put a complete ban use of polythene bags inside the campus.
- To encourage use of alternative renewable sources of energy.
- To conduct environment, energy and green audit of the college.
- To spread environmental consciousness among students, all employees and local inhabitants of the nearby communities and adopted villages.

#### Context:

Environment degradation is one of the biggest threats that concern the world at present so the college has undertaken various measures to combat it. Plantation drives are conducted in the campus frequently to aid environmental protection. Waste materials are collected from Tinsukia Municipal Board and using worms (Red Wrangler) they are converted into organic fertilizer. Two vermicomposting pits have been developed and the process takes 3-4 months. Students are also engaged in the process through proper training and

certification is done. Proper rainwater harvesting technique is used along with a water body for water conservation. Alternative energy source in the form of solar panels is installed to reduce pressure on traditional energy source. For smooth management of electrical and E-Waste, AMC (Annual Maintenance Contract) is in place. Students, faculties and supporting staff are encouraged to avail public transport in order to reduce carbon footprint and promote clean and green energy drive.

Evidence of success:

Conversion of waste from Tinsukia Municipal Board into organic fertilizer benefits the environment. The fertilizer so produced has been put up for sale and it has generated financial revenue that used in turn for campus cleaning. A circular waste management-economy of revenue has thus been created that works towards creation of a clean and green environment. More than 100 students have been trained in vermicomposting. The college has received District Green Champion Award for the year 2020- 2021 and was ranked in top 10 colleges of the district for Swachh Bharat Abhiyan.

Problems:

Shortage of staff and inadequate transportation facilities owing to the rural setting of the college.

The College believes in the importance of sports and values associated with it; team spirit, confidence, community development and nation building. Keeping in mind these points, the following objectives have been formulated:

Context:

Exposure is provided to the students in the arena of sports by making available both equipments and infrastructure. Tinsukia Commerce College has upgraded the college ground with the funds provided by the Directorate of Sports and Youth Affairs, Govt. of Assam. Football coaching is provided by the college to the students as well as interested people from outside and significantly, the College has signed MoU with Sripuria Football Academy for coaching. **Response:**

In line with the vision of the college, “Vidya Dadaati Vinayam, Vinayaad Yaati Patrattam”, that means “Learning leads to humility, Humility begets worthiness”, the college aspires to mould its students into worthy individuals by providing value-based quality education replete with all life skills that ensure their all round development. Being located in a rural area, the college seeks specifically to cater to the needs of the nearby local communities. Underprivileged students can avail the fee waiver scheme, thus making sure that every person can benefit from the right to education irrespective of class, caste, creed or social status.

To meet the requirement of modern education, in addition to traditional classroom teaching practices like lecture method, chalk and board method, etc. various student-centric techniques are applied like experiential learning, participative learning, peer learning, problem solving methods, role play, projects, group discussions and brain storming sessions.

To meet the entrepreneurial aspirations of the students and their guardians, a placement cell is constituted that strives to give a distinct edge to the students and alumni of the college in their professional ventures by making available opportunities in career development. Further, the college has signed MoU with ICT Chennai, Skillfinity, Guwahati, Bosch India and TISS Mumbai by conducting various seminars, conferences, workshops, talk shows and short-term courses to increase employability and make students job-oriented.

The college has identified slow learners, and extra attention is given to them to bring them at par with the rest of the students. Remedial classes and tutorials are also arranged on a personal level to identify their problems and keep track of their progress. One-on-one interaction enables the module of micro teaching to take place successfully.

Apart from academic teaching, value-based education is emphasized by the college that is universal in nature. The curriculum has been designed to address the current issues like Environmental consciousness, human rights, gender, professional and business ethics and a positive approach towards life.

Two vermicomposting pits have been developed through which organic fertilizer is prepared and put up for sale to generate income.

The college emphasizes on various extension activities that involves social work which inculcate into the students the spirit of unity, brotherhood, empathy, equality and team spirit that make life meaningful and complete. Community benefit programmes are organized by the college in association with the students to make them understand the significance of serving the society unconditionally. Snehalaya, an NGO for specially abled children in Tinsukia, has been mentored and financially assisted by the college for last fifteen years.. All these extra-curricular activities organized by the college are aimed at creating a positive aura within the campus that would lead to holistic development of students, faculty, college fraternity and the neighbouring community.
